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What is RUKOBIA?

RUKOBIA is a prescription medicine used with other antiretroviral (ARV) medicines to treat HIV-1 in adults who:

- have received several anti-HIV-1 regimens in the past, and
- have HIV-1 virus that is resistant to many ARV medicines, and
- are failing their current ARV therapy because it is not working, are not able to tolerate the side effects, or have other safety concerns.

HIV-1=human immunodeficiency virus type 1.

About RUKOBIA

RUKOBIA is an HIV-1 treatment that works differently from other HIV-1 treatments by stopping the virus from attaching to your CD4⁺ T-cells.

RUKOBIA is not for use alone. RUKOBIA will be given along with an HIV-1 treatment regimen recommended by your doctor.

RUKOBIA is proven to help decrease viral load in some people whose virus is still detectable despite having exhausted many other treatment options.*

How do I take RUKOBIA?



• Swallow tablets whole. Do not chew, crush, or split tablets

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

Do not take RUKOBIA if you:

- are allergic to fostemsavir or any of the ingredients in RUKOBIA.
- take certain medicines, including enzalutamide, carbamazepine, phenytoin, rifampin, mitotane, St. John's wort (Hypericum perforatum).

What are the possible side effects of RUKOBIA?

RUKOBIA can cause serious side effects including:

• Changes in your immune system. Your immune system may get stronger and begin to fight infections that have been hidden in your body for a long time. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you start having new symptoms after you start taking RUKOBIA.

How RUKOBIA was studied

In a clinical study of 371 adults with HIV-1, RUKOBIA was added to a treatment regimen and evaluated at Day 8, Weeks 24, 96, and 240.

People who entered the study met the following criteria:

The virus was detectable while on their current regimen (viral load greater than or equal to 400 copies/mL)

The virus was resistant to many HIV-1 treatments

They had limited treatment options (no more than 2

antiretroviral classes remaining)

The study included people with advanced HIV-1:

- 89% had viral load greater than 1000 copies/mL
- 75% had CD4⁺ T-cells* less than 200 cells/mm³
- 86% had history of AIDS
- 30% had CD4⁺ T-cells less than 20 cells/mm³

CD4 T-cells (also called T-cells) are white blood cells that help fight infections. CD4* T-cell count is the number of CD4⁺ T-cells per mm³ of blood.

AIDS=acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

What are the possible side effects of RUKOBIA? (cont'd)

RUKOBIA can cause serious side effects including: (cont'd)

- Heart rhythm problems (QTc prolongation). RUKOBIA may cause a heart rhythm problem called QTc prolongation. QTc prolongation causes an irregular heartbeat. If you are elderly, you may be at a greater risk for developing this heart problem with RUKOBIA. **Tell your** healthcare provider right away if you feel dizzy, lightheaded, feel changes in your heartbeat, or you faint (lose consciousness).
- Changes in liver function blood tests results. People with HIV-1 who take RUKOBIA and who also have hepatitis B or C virus infections, may be more likely to develop new or worsening changes in certain liver function blood tests during treatment with RUKOBIA.
 - If you stop your anti-hepatitis B treatment, this could mean that your hepatitis B may become active again (reactivated). Your healthcare provider may do blood tests to check your liver function.
 - Take any anti-hepatitis B or anti-hepatitis C medicines as prescribed by your healthcare provider during treatment with RUKOBIA.



Viral load decreased after 8 days*

During the first 8 days of the study, people were randomly selected to receive either RUKOBIA or a sugar pill added to their current regimen. After 8 days, the average viral load decrease was evaluated.

At Day 9, all people still on their current regimen were changed to RUKOBIA along with a tailored treatment regimen[‡] for the remainder of the study.

Some people reached undetectable and remained undetectable at 240 weeks[§]

More than half of the 272 people who took RUKOBIA with a tailored treatment regimen reached undetectable by 24 weeks and some continued to remain undetectable at 240 weeks.



• Undetectable means reducing the HIV in your blood to very low levels

• In the study, undetectable was defined as less than 40 copies/mL

- are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed if you take RUKOBIA. You should not breastfeed if you have HIV-1 because of the risk of passing HIV-1 to your baby.



Increased CD4⁺ T-cell counts^{*†}

As part of a tailored treatment regimen,[‡] RUKOBIA increased and maintained the number of infection-fighting CD4 $^+$ T-cells in the immune system.

 In people with a low CD4⁺ T-cell count (below 20 cells/mm³) at the start of the study, RUKOBIA, added to a tailored treatment regimen, helped increase CD4⁺ T-cells by more than 200 cells/mm³ on average

⁺CD4⁺ T-cells (also called T-cells) are white blood cells that help fight infections. CD4⁺ T-cell count is the number of CD4⁺ T-cells per mm³ of blood.

What were the most common side effects?^{\$}

The most common side effect through 240 weeks, reported by 5% or more of people, was nausea (11%).

• 8% of people stopped taking RUKOBIA because of adverse events

What are the possible side effects of RUKOBIA?

RUKOBIA can cause serious side effects including:

- changes in your immune system (Immune Reconstitution Syndrome)
- heart rhythm problems (QTc prolongation)
- changes in liver function blood tests results

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Some medicines interact with RUKOBIA.

Especially tell your healthcare provider if you take birth control pills (oral contraceptives) that contain ethinyl estradiol. The amount of ethinyl estradiol can become increased in your blood during treatment with RUKOBIA. Talk to your healthcare provider about which oral contraceptives may be right for you during treatment with RUKOBIA.





Dennis is taking RUKOBIA as part of an HIV-1 regimen

Dennis, tell us a little bit about yourself.

My name is Dennis. I'm married. I live with my husband, our two rescue dogs, and a rescue cat. I'm a heavily treatment-experienced person living with HIV.

What are some challenges you've experienced on your treatment journey?

When I started having treatment failure I'd say, "Oh. We're seeing virus again. But what's out there for me to take?" I had resistance to multiple classes of medications.

How did you feel when you heard about RUKOBIA? I remember hearing of this (RUKOBIA) and I was like, "Wow, we do matter."

What did it feel like for you to hear that you reached undetectable status while taking RUKOBIA as part of your HIV-1 regimen? Oh, I cheered. I cheered loud.

What's something that helped you throughout your treatment journey?

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The emotional support that you're getting from friends or family is important, because those are the people that can give you encouragement.

Keep a list of your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine.

- You can ask your healthcare provider or pharmacist for a list of medicines that interact with RUKOBIA.
- Do not start taking a new medicine without telling your healthcare provider. Your healthcare provider can tell you if it is safe to take RUKOBIA with other medicines.

How should I take RUKOBIA?

- Take RUKOBIA exactly as your healthcare provider tells you to take it.
- Take RUKOBIA tablets whole. Do not chew, crush, or split RUKOBIA tablets before swallowing.
- Take RUKOBIA with or without food.

- Can RUKOBIA interact with the additional medicines I'm taking for other conditions?
- Where can I get support information for my RUKOBIA prescription?

This is only a brief summary of important information about RUKOBIA and does not replace talking to your healthcare provider about your condition and treatment.

ABOUT RUKOBIA

RUKOBIA is a prescription medicine that is used with other antiretroviral medicines to treat Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV-1) infection in adults who:

- have received several anti-HIV-1 regimens in the past, and
- have HIV-1 virus that is resistant to many antiretroviral medicines, and
- are failing their current antiretroviral therapy. You could be failing therapy because it is not working or no longer works, you are not able to tolerate the side effects, or there are other safety reasons why you cannot take it.

HIV-1 is the virus that causes Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS).

It is not known if RUKOBIA is safe and effective in children.

HOW TO TAKE RUKOBIA

- Take RUKOBIA 2 times a day exactly as your healthcare provider tells you to take it.
- Take RUKOBIA tablets whole. Do not chew, crush, or split RUKOBIA tablets before swallowing.
- RUKOBIA can be taken with or without food.

DO NOT TAKE RUKOBIA IF YOU

- **are allergic** to fostemsavir or any of the ingredients in RUKOBIA.
- take certain medicines, including: enzalutamide; rifampin; carbamazepine; mitotane; phenytoin; St. John's wort (*Hypericum perforatum*)

BEFORE TAKING RUKOBIA

Tell your healthcare provider about all of your medical conditions, including if you:

- have or have had a heart problem, including a heart rhythm problem called QTc prolongation (irregular heartbeat).
- have or have had liver problems, including hepatitis B or C virus infection.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if RUKOBIA will harm your unborn baby.

Tell your healthcare provider if you become pregnant during treatment with RUKOBIA.

• are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed. **Do not breastfeed if you take RUKOBIA.** You should not breastfeed if you have HIV-1 because of the risk of passing HIV-1 to your baby. It is not known if RUKOBIA can pass to your baby in your breast milk. Talk with your healthcare provider about the best way to feed your baby during treatment with RUKOBIA.

Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.

Some medicines interact with RUKOBIA.

Especially tell your healthcare provider if you take birth control pills (oral contraceptives) that contain ethinyl estradiol. The amount of ethinyl estradiol can become increased in your blood during treatment with RUKOBIA. Talk to your healthcare provider about which oral contraceptives may be right for you during treatment with RUKOBIA.

Keep a list of your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine.


